Then they gave three gifts to the baby: gold, frankincense, and myrrh.


A message came to them in a dream.

Prayers of the People

- IP: Loving God, we are here to celebrate and to receive the story of the birth of Jesus. Yet, even as we celebrate, we know that there are many in need here and around the world. We come before in the darkness, awaiting the light so that all the world may know your love and peace, O God.
- IP: Mothering God, We think of those who are experiencing so many emotions this Christmas, especially those who are not feeling merry or joyous. Be with those who won't be with family or friends for Christmas, those who are sad and grieving for a loved one, and all who are facing struggles and challenges of many kinds, especially those named on our prayer list and in our hearts. Let us pray ...

C: May all the world know your love and peace, O God.

IP: Creator God, We pray for your Earth and all of your other-than-human creation.

Remind us that your imagination is limitless - you dreamt up the giraffe, the elephant, the narwhal, the giant redwoods, and the stars that guided the magi. Let us remember that loving you, God, means loving all of creation in all we do.

C: May all the world know your love and peace, O God.

IP: Holy Redeemer, We beg for peace where there is war, especially in Gaza, the Ukraine, Sudan, and Myanmar. In our own country, we ask for courage to protest injustice and compassion for those on the societal margins such as our neighbors who are houseless, hungry, or persecuted. Strengthen us to show your light to those for whom dawn seems impossibly far away.

C: May all the world know your love and peace, O God.

IP: Newborn Christ, We pray for expectant parents everywhere, both biological and adoptive. While there may be joy and excitement about a new child, there also lies fear and unknowing. Let us see in each other, and in all your people, the face of you as a newborn: fragile, pure love, and in need of care.

C: May all the world know your love and peace, O God.

We can have so many different memories and emotions at Christmas. Like those there at the first Christmas, we can be happy, sad, joyful, frustrated, peaceful, and angry. Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, the Wise Ones, and the innkeeper all discovered you were with them. They found your peace when Jesus was born. In the same way, may people

everywhere find peace in knowing that you are with us, today and always, for Jesus came as Emmanuel, God-with-us.

IP: On the count of 3, let's all say together, "The peace of Christ be with you always!"


Offering



Luke 2:[1-7] 8-20

Nativity of Our Lord/Christmas Day

[The angel said,] "I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people." (v. 10)

Yes, it's the lowly shepherds out in the fields with their sheep. The long-awaited Messiah doesn't come in power and majesty as some had hoped. He is born in humble circumstances, not a palace. Even today some people would rather see Jesus as a man of power, vanquishing all his enemies (and all their enemies). But that is not what God chose.

This really *is* good news. From the very beginning, God wanted to make clear that the Messiah was meant for all people, not just for the few, for the wealthy. Not only was the birthplace of Jesus humble, but the first ones to hear about the birth were shepherds—not exactly the most socially acceptable people of that time. They didn't waste any time in heading to Bethlehem to see this child, nor did they keep the good news a secret. They praised God and told others what they had heard and seen; and all were amazed. What wondrous love is this!

Thank you for your extravagant love, O God. Help us share this love. In the name of Jesus. Amen.
